REFLECTIVE WRITING INSTRUCTIONS:

These are step-by-step suggestions for those of us who like more concrete instructions. Remember, as long as you have a posture of openness and listening, there is no right or wrong way to structure your reflective writing.

- 1. As you prepare to write, invite the Holy Spirit into your process. Then, listen for what comes up within yourself as a starting place. You can wait as long as you need there is no pressure, no rush.
- 2. Notice any distracting thoughts or emotions, with curiosity and without judgment.
- 3. You can write about these thoughts and emotions first if you would like, and/or simply ask God to clear your mind so that you can hear his voice.
- 4. As you listen, try to put aside any preconceived notions you may have of what God might say to you, or even of how you normally hear from him. Posture yourself to hear not what you expect God to say, but what God is actually saying.
- 5. If you don't feel like you are hearing anything, that's ok! You can simply start writing and God will speak through that process in a way you can understand.
- 6. Respond to the prompts that stand out to you.

REFLECTIVE WRITING TIPS:

- You can write in first person, using "I" statements.
- You can write to God, either as a prayer or simply writing to him as you would a close confidante.
- You can invite God into your experiences as you recount them.
- You can write stream-of-consciousness.
- You can write certain key words that resonate with you you don't have to write complete sentences.
- You can write poetry.

WRITING PROMPTS:

Read the following writing prompts and respond to any that resonate with you. Keep in mind that these are only starting points – the Holy Spirit may lead you somewhere entirely different than what you expected, or than what the prompt asks! You do not have to "stay with" the prompt in any rigid sense.

Think back over the last few weeks or months. ("Listen to your life.")
Where have you sensed God speaking to you about your gifts and passions? Can you think of specific situations you have been in, thoughts you have had, or people you have talked with that filled you with excitement or new energy? When have you felt refreshed or inspired? Reflect on these experiences using whatever details or images the Lord brings to mind...and don't worry, he will bring things to mind. Remember, all you have to do is be open to him and listen.

Think back to the original opening exercise:

"If you had to write words to describe who you are, what would you say?" Try doing it again, but try to go beyond your roles. You can write about how you view yourself, how you think God views you, what characteristics or gifts you have that seem unique, or whatever else comes to mind. Do you tend to compare yourself or your calling with those of others? How so? What do you think it would be like not to compare in this way? What would it feel like? What do you think is holding you back from walking into the fullness of God's calling for you at this time in your life? What would it take to overcome that barrier?
